About Florenceville-Bristol

The Villages of Florenceville and Bristol amalgamated in 2008 to form the Town of Florenceville-Bristol. It is located in the northwestern part of New Brunswick, and is known as “The French Fry Capital of the World”. Explore our rich culture and learn about our agriculture heritage in the region known as the Potato Belt of New Brunswick.

Located in the Saint John River Valley, it is just minutes from the Canada/USA border, and directly off the Trans Canada Highway, it is convenient to explore other parts of our beautiful province or commute for meetings.

The Fredericton International Airport is located 90 minutes away, making vacation or business travel convenient.

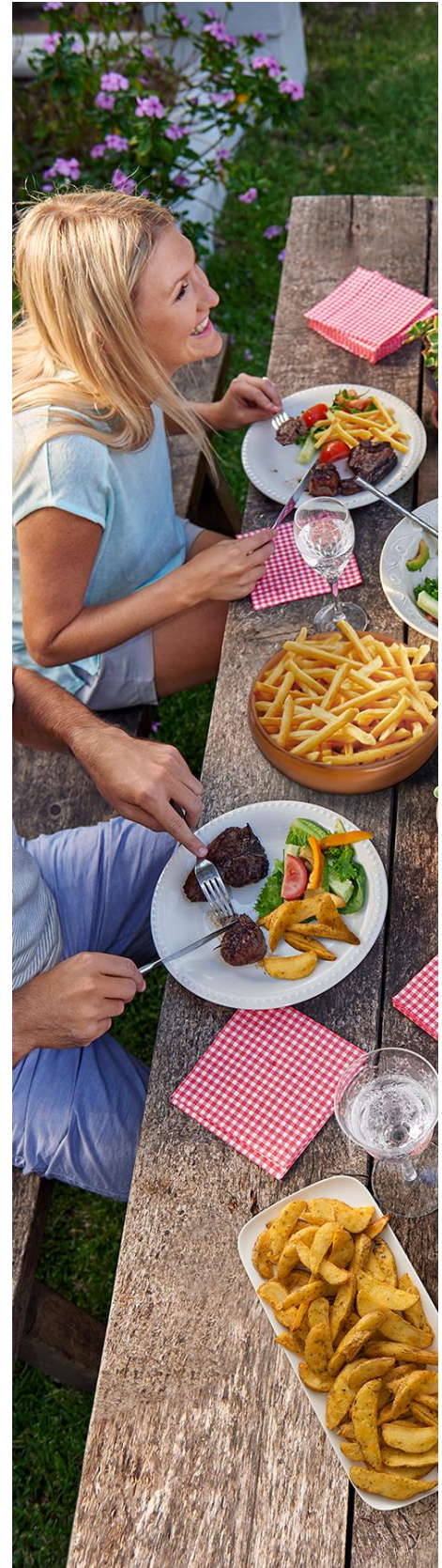
Being in the Potato Belt, there is a high concentration of farms in the surrounding area, as well as food processing plants, and produce packing facilities.

Florenceville-Bristol is home to the corporate headquarters for McCain Foods. They are one of the world's largest manufacturers of frozen French fries and potato specialties. Their products can be found in thousands of restaurants and supermarket freezers around the world - one in every four French fries across the globe is a McCain fry.

McCain Produce is a private family-owned company and an industry leader in quality, delivering top-quality potatoes across the globe. Those doing business with McCain Produce experience and appreciate the attributes on which the company was built: integrity, honesty and reliability. This foundation plus its association with its parent company, McCain Foods Limited, provides McCain Produce with an unrivalled global reach.

Another member of the McCain group of companies located in our Town is McCain Fertilizer, who provide top-quality fertilizer products to ensure farmers achieve their best crops.

Mountain View Packers is another potato business that calls Florenceville-Bristol home. They are a family owned and operated business that packs potatoes and cauliflower for the fresh market. They source all of their potatoes from local farmers while the cauliflower is grown on site at their own farm.



In April 2015, IBM Canada established a new IT services delivery center in Florenceville-Bristol that will provide McCain Foods' global operations with system infrastructure support, resiliency, security and mobility services. The facility also provides security compliance and tools services to other IBM clients. Through partnership and collaboration, IBM is planting the economic development seeds to help transition New Brunswick into a knowledge worker economy that can positively tackle challenges for the benefit of all Canadians and organizations around the world.

Florenceville-Bristol is also home to H.J. Crabbe & Sons Lumber Mill. This long-running family business specializes in its quality softwood lumber made mainly from Balsam Fir and White Spruce. The company also produces wood stove pellets to use more of what would be scrap material to help cut down on waste. The company is also one of the largest landowners in the province, next to Irving and Frasier.

Bell Wire Products Ltd. boasts an 18,000 square foot production facility, and is a supplier of wire products to the Floral, Horticultural, and Christmas Greenery and Commercial Freezer Basket Industries. They also own Bell's Woodlots Ltd., who manufactures Christmas Wreaths and has Christmas Tree Plantations, as well as a working woodlot. This seasonal employer hires many Christmas Wreath workers every Fall.

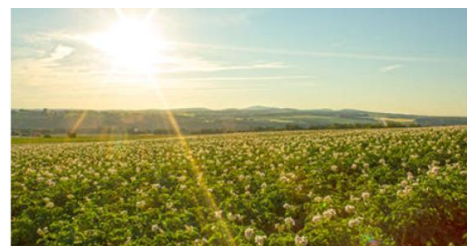
Our Population

According to Statistics Canada, the Town of Florenceville-Bristol has a population of 1,604 as of the 2016 census.

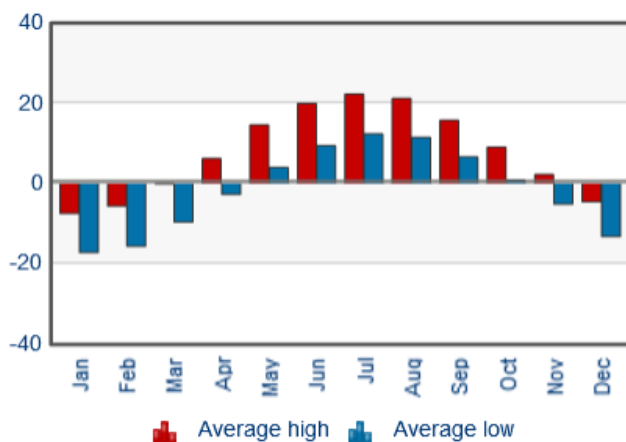


Our Weather

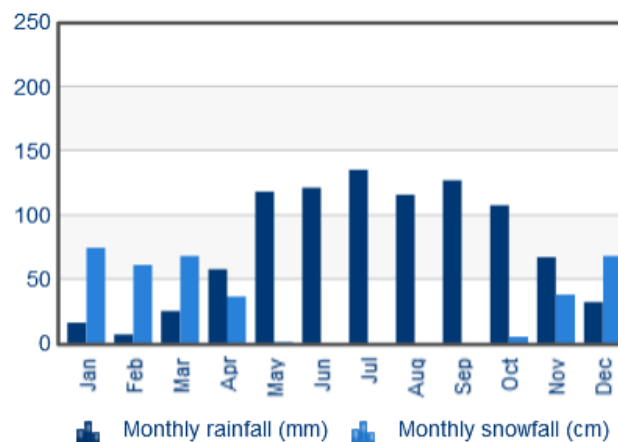

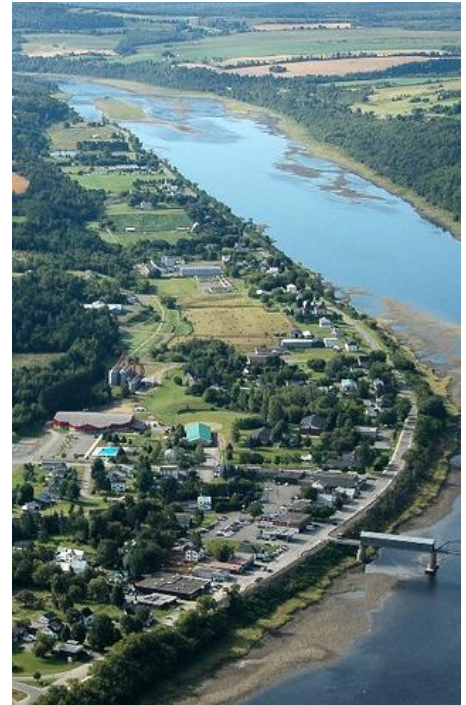
Renting an Apartment or House

Buying a House

According to the Canadian Real Estate Magazine, the median price for a home in Florenceville is \$144,400 (Aug 2016). Across the country, Florenceville-Bristol is in the lowest priced 40% when all of Canada's suburbs are listed in order of real estate listing prices.

The \$144,400 price tag on the median Florenceville-Bristol home means that it is below the national norm.

Investors looking for properties in Florenceville-Bristol are most likely to find 3 bedroom homes on offer, with 4 bedroom potential investment properties the second most popular.

Purchasing a house is a good investment, but the process takes some time. You may search on your own, or enlist the services of a real estate agent who can assist with the process.

Property Tax Rates (2018)

There are two levels of property tax:

- 1) Provincial
- 2) Municipal

The provincial tax helps pay for healthcare, education, social services, the administration of justice and more.

Municipal taxes help pay for municipal services such as policing, fire services, recreation, infrastructure, general administration and more.

Municipalities determine tax rates during the annual budget process. For the 2018 tax year, 49% of municipal governments raised their tax rates.

The Town of Florenceville-Bristol has been able to maintain a residential tax rate of \$1.2899 per \$100 of assessed value for six years with no increases.

Home Heating

Public Transit: There is no public transit in Florenceville-Bristol.

By-Laws and Permits

Residents who construct or renovate a building on their property are responsible to obtain a Building Permit from the Town Office. A complete list of what requires a permit can be found on our website at <https://www.florencevillebristol.ca/building-permits>.

The Building Permit Application can be faxed, emailed or dropped off at the Town Office, and are usually approved within 7 days. More complex plans may take additional time to review. Health Care

Florenceville-Bristol has one medical clinic, one dental clinic, and two optometrist offices.

The Upper River Valley Hospital is located a 15 minute drive from Florenceville-Bristol. It is the newest hospital in New Brunswick, and has been designated as the first full service hospital in Canada to be recognized as a leader in energy and environmental design.

New Brunswick Medicare Eligibility

To be eligible for New Brunswick Medicare coverage you must be:

- a Canadian citizen or be legally entitled to remain in Canada and a resident who makes his/her permanent and principle home in New Brunswick; or
- an international student who meets the eligibility criteria.

A “resident” means a person lawfully entitled to be or to remain in Canada, who makes his home and is ordinarily present in New Brunswick, but does not include a tourist, transient or visitor to the Province; as legislated under New Brunswick's Medical Services Payment Act

The following individuals are not eligible for coverage:

- regular members of the Canadian Armed Forces, (however members of their families are eligible);
- tourists and visitors to the province;
- transients;
- students from another province; and
- inmates of federal penitentiaries.

Maintaining a dwelling, owning property in the province of New Brunswick or paying New Brunswick property or income tax does not mean you are eligible for insured services under New Brunswick Medicare.

Medicare cards will be automatically renewed and mailed providing Medicare has current addresses. In addition, cards may be renewed for five years.

Cards will be mailed to the address Medicare has on file. If their address changes, New Brunswickers are reminded to call Service New Brunswick at 1-888-762-8600 or complete a Change Request, Replacement and/or Renewal form (see forms). All household members affected by the move must be indicated on the form. Failure to notify New Brunswick Medicare of your address change may result in termination of your Medicare coverage.



Education

The Province of New Brunswick manages the education system. English language education with options for French language immersion programs are available at our schools. Florenceville-Bristol is located in the Anglophone West School District (ASD-W) and is home to four public schools:

NBCC Woodstock is located in the heart of downtown Woodstock. It is known as “New Brunswick’s First Town”, a friendly community nestled at the juncture of two great rivers: the Saint John and the Meduxnekeag.

It offers several regular programs in the areas of Business, Health, IT, Social Sciences and Trades.

The campus has student wireless internet access, a gymnasium, cafeteria, library, bookstore, shops and computer labs.

Municipal Services

Protective Services

Florenceville-Bristol contracts the services of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police (RCMP), and are dispatched through the Woodstock office of the RCMP.

The Province of New Brunswick operates a highly integrated, enhanced 911 system. Dialing this number on the telephone connects you to appropriate emergency service providers such as police, ambulance, fire, and poison control. This number is for Emergency use only.

In the event of an emergency, dial 911. To reach local RCMP when it is not an emergency situation, call 325-3000 to speak to an officer.

The 911 operator will dispatch the Florenceville-Bristol Fire Department in the event of a fire. They are located on Juniper Road, comprised of volunteer fire fighters.

Waste Disposal Services

The Western Valley Regional Service Commission contracts the waste disposal for Florenceville-Bristol. Garbage is picked up curbside every Thursday within the Town limits.

Starting in the Spring of 2018, the Town will be implementing a curbside recycling program. There will be no sorting or separating involved. Items to be recycled are paper, plastics, metals and cardboard in one bin. One cart will be provided to each residence at no additional cost. 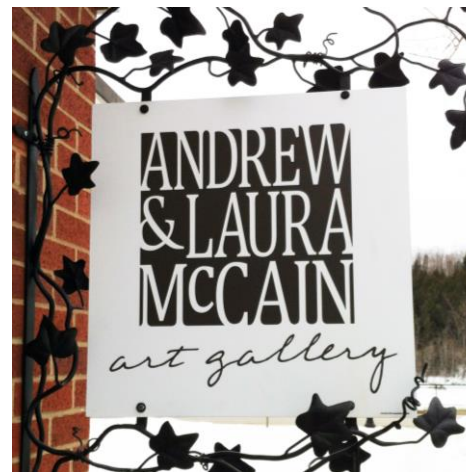

Not far down the street is an extension of the Art Gallery called the River Arts Centre & Studios. It is a not-for-profit organization whose mission is to increase access, awareness and appreciation of art in our community. Outdoors & Adventure

The Saint John River not only offers a beautiful view from shore, but also has a lot to offer on the water too. Enjoy great fishing or a new perspective of the Town's landscape from a kayak, canoe or tube, with rentals available locally from Riverview Outfitters. Be sure to watch overhead for many bald eagles soaring through our skies too.

Florenceville-Bristol is home to many trails for any activity you want to enjoy, but be sure to bring a camera along to capture the picturesque scenery and wildlife along the way. The Shiktehawk Trail is perfect for walking or hiking. The NB Trail runs from one end of Town to the other, and is available for snowmobiling through the winter months, and non-motorized use through the summer. The Town is home to a three-hole golf course at Sam's Place Park. This park also has a playground, fish ponds, and hiking trails. It is a peaceful location, and the perfect spot for a family picnic.

Locally Grown

Florenceville-Bristol is fortunate to have the ideal climate, topography and rich soil for growing many products. While we're known for growing potatoes, farmers produce a variety of vegetables and grains here. Be sure to check out the Florenceville-Bristol Outdoor Summer Market from June to September for locally grown produce, as well as a variety of other handmade crafts and baking.

Hunter Brothers Farm Market is another favourite for farm-fresh vegetables, but you'll find so much more. During their Fall Festival, they create a new design for their elaborate cornfield maze. You can enjoy family-oriented, kid-powered entertainment for a few hours or the whole day. Watch goats perform their climbing abilities on the "Goat Walk" and then get lost in the six-acre cornfield maze. Take a wagon ride, slide down the giant slides, grope your way through the dark maze, cheer for your favourite pig at the Pigtucky Derby race, crawl over the straw structures and get stuck on their giant spider web. When it is time to re-energize, stop by their snack shack with food and beverages.

You'll find many other roadside stands nearby with locally grown produce, like Blackie's Veggies, Manic Organic, McIntosh's Berry U-Pick, or other pop-up veggie stands that still use the honour system for payment.

With our abundance of maple trees, maple syrup producers in the area collect sap every spring, and boil it down into the sweet treat we all love with Sunday breakfast. Many producers offer tours of their sugarbush, maple taffy-on-the-snow, and pancake breakfasts. During the summer months, you can find local maple products at our Welcome Centre by the Shogomoc Railway Station.

Spring is also the time for picking fiddleheads. Fiddleheads are the unfurled frond of a fern plant. They grow near rivers and streams, and are picked in the Spring of the year. Once boiled, add butter and vinegar to enjoy a local favourite.

The New Brunswick government has set the minimum wage at \$11.25/hour as of April 1, 2018.

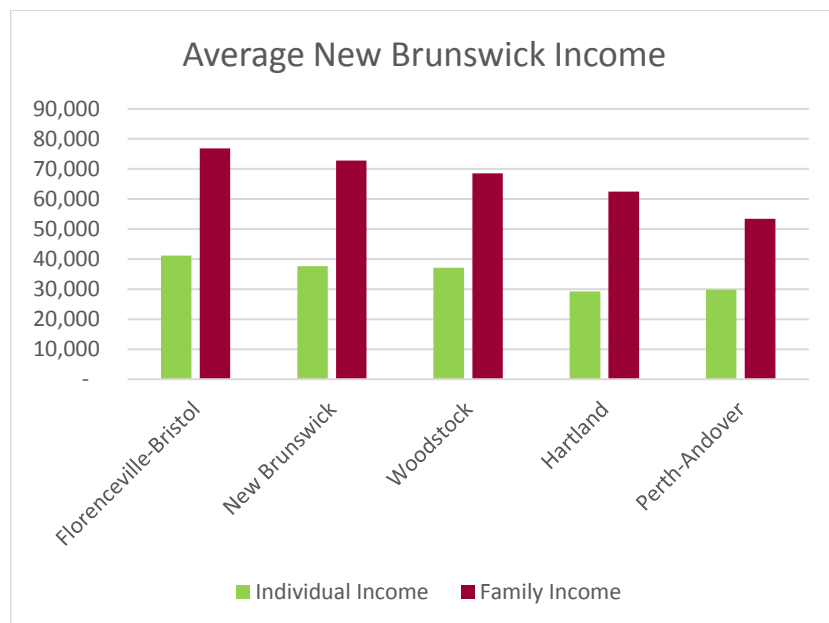
In a news release from the province on February 8, 2018, "The goals behind New Brunswick's multi-year economic growth plan are to grow the economy, create jobs and put more money in the pockets of New Brunswickers," said Premier Brian Gallant. "We have raised the minimum wage four times since we have been the government to provide a strong workforce for business and so we can spur economic growth that works for all New Brunswickers."



Average New Brunswick Income

According to Statistics Canada's 2016 Census, the average income of Florenceville-Bristol residents over the age of 15 was \$41,171, while the provincial average was \$37,611. The same report shows the average income of two or more-person households in Florenceville-Bristol is \$76,847, while the provincial average is \$72,786.

Legal Services

Social Insurance Number (SIN)

A social insurance number (SIN) is a nine-digit identification number given to you for the purposes of income tax, child tax benefit, employment insurance, old age pension or other government programs. You must have a social insurance number to work in Canada.

To apply, visit a Service Canada office. The nearest Service Canada office is located in Woodstock at 680 Main Street (in the Post Office). An application form must be filled out and original (not photocopied) passports and/or immigration documents must be presented.

Currency

The national currency is the Canadian Dollar. Banknotes come in denominations of \$5, \$10, \$20, \$50, and \$100 and all have their own distinct colours and graphics. Coins include the five cent (a nickel); 10 cent (a dime); 25 cent (a quarter); one dollar (a loonie), and two dollar (a toonie).

This will show you what the current rate of exchange is, but note the banks will have a fee built in, so you should consult your bank's website for a more accurate conversion.

Financial Institutions

There is one bank in the Florenceville-Bristol area offering services like: saving and chequing accounts, debit and credit cards, mortgages and personal loans, etc. Centreville, Hartland and Woodstock have other banks. Visit Yellow Pages for a complete list of banks in the community.

Driving

Every person who wishes to drive must have a valid driver's license, which must be carried on them at all times while driving a vehicle. Depending on your situation, you may or may not have to take a driver's test. More information can be found at:

Politics

Municipal Government

Florenceville –Bristol Town Council was sworn in on May 24, 2016 and will serve the community of Florenceville-Bristol through May 2020. See details on our Mayor and Council on our website:

Members of Council are elected using a ward system, meaning the municipality is divided into sections (wards) by a by-law of Council, which provides a description of the boundaries of each individual ward.

Council members elected to represent a ward must reside in that ward and the residents of that particular ward vote for the candidates of their choice. Florenceville-Bristol is composed of two wards, Ward 1 (former Village of Bristol) and Ward 2 (former Village of Florenceville). The Florenceville-Bristol Town Council consists of three Councillors elected from Ward 1, three Councillors elected from Ward 2 and a Mayor elected at large by all voters in the municipality. Elections of these representatives are held by secret ballot. It is important to exercise your right to vote.

The Town of Florenceville-Bristol, pursuant to municipal by-laws operates on a Council-Chief Administrative Officer (CAO) system, based upon the principle of separation of policy from administration. Council is responsible for setting policy, while staff, through the Chief Administrative Officer is responsible for administration. Council is not involved in the day-to-day administrative activities of the municipality. All recommendations to Council flow from the department head through the Chief Administrative Officer to Council.

Committees with a committee chair exist, but their function is to examine policy alternatives, to seek the views of the public and to provide advice to council. They have no direct role in supervision or management of any municipal department or service. Recommendations are forwarded to Council for review and consideration at the Regular Council Meeting.

The Mayor and Councillors serve on many Committees, Boards and Commissions and provide input and direction on sectors ranging from recreation to arts, to economic development and regional services.



Alcohol, Tobacco and Drugs

In New Brunswick, the law states that:

- You must be 19 years of age to purchase, consume or possess alcohol or cigarettes.
- Drinking alcohol and driving is illegal.
- Possession or consumption of drugs that have not been prescribed by a doctor or purchased at a pharmacy is illegal.

Recreational-Use Cannabis

The provincial government introduced legislative framework for recreational-use cannabis November 2017 in anticipation of the federal government legalizing such use in 2018.

No one under 19 will be permitted in Cannabis NB stores. The locations of these stores were chosen by the provincial government to ensure they are an appropriate distance from schools and daycares.



Multiculturalism

Florenceville-Bristol has a developing multicultural population. As of the 2016 Census, nearly 8% of the Town's population are immigrants to Canada, while New Brunswick has 4.5%.

In and around the year 2000 there was a large influx of foreign trained professionals recruited to work at McCain Foods and McCain International. Primarily these professionals were in the Information Technology industry and many settled in the Florenceville-Bristol area with their families. By 2001 a group of individuals started to recognize that these families were experiencing difficulties integrating into the community. Some of the notable needs were language training, social integration, employment for spouses and education assistance aimed at helping students adjust to Canadian schools. The group of individuals was composed of newcomers and concerned local citizens. They met regularly in the typical Carleton County manner – in someone's kitchen.

Over the years, this group has developed into the Multicultural Association of Carleton County (MACC).

MACC serves Carleton County communities by providing assistance for newcomers, permanent residents, temporary foreign workers and their families with:

- Family Settlement in new community, including assistance with accommodation, school registration, medical and practical information.
- Assistance with immigration information and guidance with permanent resident and citizenship applications
- Finding employment opportunities suitable for clients qualifications
- Preparation of resumes, career portfolios and interviewing skills
- Networking and instructional opportunities to expand client abilities
- Online classes for different levels of proficiency
- Classroom classes
- Study materials
- Preparation for official language proficiency test – CELPIP
